



CAO REPORT

April 28, 2025

The following report provides Council with an update on the activities and projects of the Town. The report does not provide an all-encompassing review of Town activities, but does provide Council with a brief update on some of the more noteworthy activities and events.

The Town is working with the Calgary Regional Airshed Zone (CRAZ: [Home | Calgary Region Airshed Zone](#)) on the possibility of locating a portable air monitoring station in Claresholm. This station captures information that the purple air monitor cannot, such as hydrocarbons, carbon monoxide and ozone levels. The portable station is currently in Okotoks, and Council will make the final decision on whether the station comes to Claresholm. A couple years ago the Town installed a Purple Air monitoring station at the office ([Real-time Air Quality Monitoring by PurpleAir](#)) and became a member of CRAZ. The Town has a representative from the community that attends CRAZ board meetings.

Several other initiatives throughout the month include meeting with prospective businesses looking to establish operations in Claresholm, meeting with MD council to discuss firehall expansion, and several meetings with solar companies interested in the arena solar project. In addition, staff (including CAO) continue to maintain the Town's bylaw program in the absence of a full-time bylaw officer, who is currently out on sick leave. Town staff continue to respond to bylaw complaints as they are received. There is no proactive bylaw enforcement at the moment.

Amundsen Park is booking up for events over the summer months. Several groups have already reserved the facilities for their events. The Town's weekly markets will be every Tuesday afternoon throughout the summer. The Claresholm Farmer's market will be every Wednesday afternoon throughout the summer, and several other groups are booking the park for their respective activities throughout the summer. It should be a busy and eventful summer in the newly upgraded downtown park.

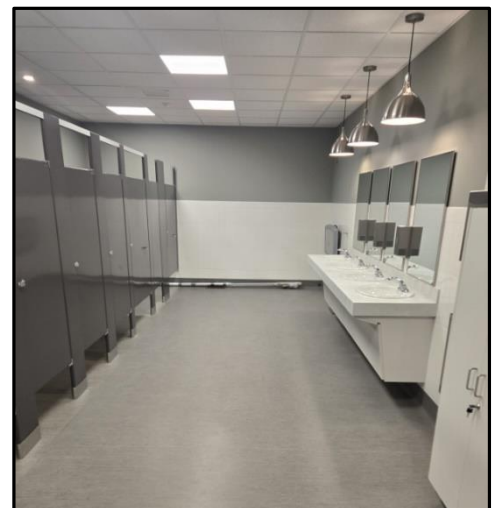
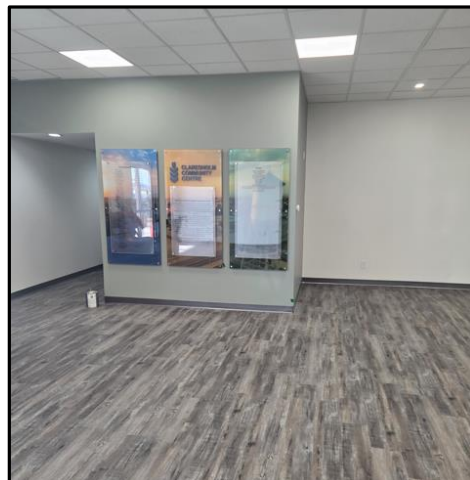

Welcoming Claresholm

*Welcoming Claresholm has scheduled its first meeting and training session this month to begin the process of becoming a registered society.

Events

* First Fair Days planning meeting, - theme: Old West Jamboree! We're looking forward to collaborating with both new and returning groups to bring some fresh energy to the event. In the meantime, planning is also underway for Canada Day celebrations

Downtown Engagement and Tourism

*Outdoor Markets- we have 26 vendors signed up for the Outdoor Market, and each week a different local group will be hosting a community event alongside it. Some fun highlights include the library's free lemonade stand, Such Drama's open mic day, and CIBC's Cure for Cancer BBQ. We've also encouraged local businesses to participate with sidewalk sales and outdoor promotions to help bring even more energy downtown.

*On the tourism front, I'm putting the final touches on the new Tourism Claresholm website, which includes our exciting Stay & Play incentive. This year, we've added 15 new businesses to the QR code run. Each will receive a window decal with a scannable QR code for summer visitors, making it easier for people to explore all we have to offer.

*Toured all our local restaurants and gathered footage for a premium commercial for Tourism Alberta, as we work toward joining their Food Tourism initiative. Our goal is to highlight Claresholm as a destination for high-end culinary experiences—without the need to go to the city.

*In partnership with Jordyn at the Museum, we're rebranding it into a Tourism Information Centre. We're revamping the gift shop (still a secret for now!) to include the beautiful new town swag I designed with a local company, plus curated local products that reflect Claresholm's old-fashioned, handmade charm. We're also adding a candy section featuring vintage glass-bottled pop and treats—this will be a wonderful new addition for both visitors and locals alike. Grand opening is May 24th

*We're also grateful to be working alongside Anna Look, whose expertise is already proven invaluable. I'm looking forward to discovering new ways to expand Claresholm's tourism potential with her guidance.

*Lastly, I'm collaborating with the Chamber of Commerce on the Flower planters Project, which will be a key part of our downtown beautification efforts.

Education /Training

*Ali, Brad, and I recently attended the Economic Development Summit in Banff, and it was an incredible experience. We had the opportunity to connect with inspiring individuals and learn from innovative communities and influential leaders from across the region.

I attended several insightful sessions, including Marketing and Branding Places, Housing Crisis Incentives, Sports Tourism, and Infrastructure Incentive Programs, just to name a few. Each one offered practical tools, fresh ideas, and inspiring success stories.

*This month, I'll also be attending the Explore Trade Show in Fort Macleod, where I'll be representing Claresholm and our surrounding region. I'll be highlighting areas where we see strong potential for economic growth, as well as promoting our upcoming events and community initiatives. It's another great opportunity to build regional connections and showcase everything Claresholm has to offer.



CAO Report for April 2025

- Launched the new Southern Alberta Senior Protect Society by having a dinner and presentation. Gabrielle Kirk presented to agencies in Claesholm to describe how the new Elder Abuse program will work within Claesholm and area.
- Attended the Calgary-Bow Regional meeting at the Saskatoon Farm. We heard from the President of FCSSAA and the Regional Rep for FCSSAA. We also heard from representatives from AB Munis and Rural Municipalities of AB. Had a roundtable to hear about other programs (what's working and what's not). Big discussion on homelessness and lack of rentals.
- Helped to host a senior presentation on scams at Cottonwood. We partner once a month with Cottonwood to host topics that interest seniors.
- Starla hosted a Family Bingo. 30 people in attendance.
- Subsidizing a Babysitting and Home Alone course that is offered by Linda Smiley
- Met with Rob to discuss volunteering for an article he is writing for the paper.
- Hosted the Volunteer Appreciation event. It was a great evening with around 260 participants. Lots of positive feedback.

42 surveys were filled out -28 female and 14 males.

1. This Volunteer Appreciation Event has helped me feel important to my community- 20 strongly agreed, 14 agreed, 4 somewhat agreed and 1 strongly disagreed
 2. This event has helped me feel recognized for what I do. – 16 strongly agreed, 19 agreed, 1 somewhat agreed and 1 disagreed.
- Working on the annual report to Rural Development Network for the grant that we received for Reaching Home. We used the full \$15,000 in the first year. We received another \$15,000 for the next fiscal period (April 1st to March 31st)
 - Working on the next bi-annual report for FRN due April 30th
 - Taxes is wrapping up in a few days. We are at 500 files that have been prepared. This is slightly ahead of last year. New volunteers for the tax program and doing well. Very keen to help. 3 new volunteers are learning how to prepare taxes for filing and a couple of volunteers were used for intake and to phone when the taxes were ready for pickup.

Infrastructure Services Report

Arena

The ice has been removed and we have already had a couple of off-season rentals. The arena floor is now set up for summer programming, and the rink dividers are being utilized to separate the area.

Parks

Gopher control is underway, with bait stations placed in green spaces, as well as members of the Public Works crew applying a rodenticide foam directly to their holes. Spring cleanup continues in all green spaces and mowing will begin very soon.

Removal has begun on the Centennial Park playground. The new play structure will be installed May 5-9, with the soft surfacing to be installed the end of May.

Equipment

The tilt-rotator attachment was installed on the new excavator. This attachment has a grapple attached to grab material and allows for 50 degrees of tilt and 360 degrees of rotation on the buckets, allowing for more precise digging and grading.



Town Buildings

Construction is now complete at the Community Centre, although we are still waiting on some replacement material for deficiencies. An electrical inspection was completed at the hall after some issues were discovered during the renovation. A couple of panel upgrades may be needed to help balance the electrical load of the building.

Regular spring maintenance continues on the rest of Town owned facilities.

Garbage

No issues to report. The modified spring cleanup program will begin May 5th.

Water Distribution

No issues to report with the water distribution system. Hydrant flushing and maintenance will begin mid-May.

Sanitary Sewers

The annual sewer flush continues. We have begun adding an active enzyme product to the sewer system to combat the grease and fats in the system. We are in our third week of adding the enzymes and we have had positive results.



Storm Water/Drainage

No issues to report in the storm system.



Sidewalks

The 2025 sidewalk tender has been posted, closing May 12th.

Recycling

The EPR program has begun, a few customers were missed in the transition, but everything seems to be working smoothly.

Staff

Interviews were completed for the seasonal labourers and gardener positions. The candidates will start May 12th.

Cemetery

Maintenance continues at the Cemetery.

The old shed at the cemetery was demolished and hauled to the landfill, the new shed was delivered and installed.

Streets

Street sweeping and road repair continue. The frost heave on 2nd and 45th was cored out in preparation for paving contractors.

CLARESHOLM RECREATION

ARENA

- The Arena has wrapped up for 2024-25 Season
- The Thunders Alumni Tournament raised \$41,234 March 28-30, 2025, over \$10,000 more than 2023
 - 13 Community groups will be recipients of the Grant funding
 - Used the older format for the Monitor to ensure dressing room assignments updated in a timely fashion
 - Recreation updated the s=monitor to showcase classic Thunders photographs, and current Minor Hockey.
- LiveBarn: went live March 4, 2025. This streaming service is free for facilities, is paid for through subscriptions, and after a certain number of subscriptions tied to our code clrs-holm the Town will receive 20% of subscription fees back.
 - Were sent the wrong Arenas advertising in March, waiting on updated promotional material
 - Livebarn is turned off for the Summer
- Annual Gun show: Had a great showing April 12 & 13. This popular event always fills up
 - The group hires the Claresholm Fish and Game Association to provide security for the event yearly
- New Score Clock: Has been ordered. Will be in the colour Grass Green, Grant funding through Claresholm and District Cooperators.
- User Meeting: Scheduled April 1, 2025 in the Town Council Chambers
 - Pond hockey is looking for 5-7:30pm on a Friday night. Will start the season earlier, and finish earlier in the season.
 - Recommended 4:30 start
 - Claresholm Minor Hockey: CAHL is updating their scheduling protocols, may impact when games can be scheduled, depending on distance teams travel
 - Claresholm Skating Club; Looking to update LED Lighting with dimming feature in fall
 - New Fox: Uncertainty at this time if they will continue on in the next season. Requested confirmation to be able to find another concession operator if required. Operator lost money in the 2024-25 season
 - Junior A- did not attend the meeting, no communication since March 1st, 2025.
 - Friday evening games: request that we have the ability to schedule 2 games, eg. game at 6pm, and 8pm (8:30pm) The Arena missed out due to scheduling of the ice for JRA to start at 7pm.
 - Kin Craig Zimmer will be bringing the Scoreclock to their upcoming meeting to recommend sponsoring a portion of the cost that the Cooperators Grant will not cover.



CAC

EASTER WEEK PROGRAMMING

- Easter week swim lessons running Tuesday – Friday 8 AM – 11 AM, 3 instructors in the water. Registration was at 70% capacity.

- Bronze Cross Lifeguard course, Tuesday – Thursday 8 AM – 4 PM, 100% capacity with 12 participants.
- Lots of open public swims for Easter week with no school. Tuesday public swim 2 – 7 PM had 47 attendees.

SPRING/SUMMER

- Recreation guide for spring/summer was released Thursday March 13th.
- Registration opened March 19th at 12 PM for our spring/summer programs. Programs are outlined until the end of August.
- Registration is starting to pick up for summer lesson!!

PUBLIC SWIMS

Our weekend public swims are maintaining between 50 – 90 people on both Saturday & Sundays.

AQUAFIT

- Our water movement program has grown rapidly on Tuesday & Thursday 11:15-11:45 AM from 4 candidates to averaging 8-11.
- Our AM class has grown slowly, previously steady at 8 – 10 people, the last few weeks have been 12 – 14 participants.
- 1 – 2 PM is averaging 19 – 24 participants.
- Evening Bootcamp has increased between 8 – 14 participants

ADVANCED COURSES

- *Bronze Cross* – April – Currently running – 12 participants
- *National Lifeguard* – May/June – Currently 9/12 registered, 2 backed out due to scheduling conflicts.
- *Lifesaving Swim Instructor* – We added a Lifesaving Swim Instructor course as we recognized the need as no facilities Calgary south were running any. Currently 8 registered.
- Recertifications: We have been running recerts for Lifeguards, and recently started to open up slots for other participants from the community, (similar to before Covid.)
 - *Lifesaving Swim Instructor Recert- May 24th – 5 external candidates registered*
 - *National Lifeguard Recert – May 9th – 7 external candidates registered*
 - *National Lifeguard Recert – June 20th – 3 external candidates registered*
- Advanced courses require a minimum of 4 participants to run the program.

SCHOOL LESSONS & PROGRAMS

- School lessons are in full swing. Stavelly, Little Bow Colony, Jumbo Valley & Barons School have all been through our doors. Meadow Creek Elementary school is next.
- Emailed all local and surrounding community schools for year end pool bookings for the month of June.

SWIM LESSONS

- Working towards space sharing with the swim club to allow for public swim lessons along side the Kraken swim club. Working through the details.
- We will be transitioning from 6-day lesson sets to 8-day lesson sets, hoping to see an increase in our success rate for passing.
- We will be offering evening summer lessons in August as swim club has a shorted season this year.

HOMESCHOOL LESSONS

- We had a open space that was not booked for school lessons the last week in May, so we have taken that opportunity to open up a Homeschool Lesson set running the Monday – Friday.
- Having reached out to the homeschool community prior we have gathered interest in this opportunity.

SWIM CLUB

- Swim club will be returning as of May 1st. They will be utilizing the pool Monday – Friday.

- Nanton will be space sharing the Krakens Tuesday & Thursdays, they have also booked Friday evenings & Saturday mornings allowing all of our regular programming to go uninterrupted.
- They will be hosting their annual swim meet June 20 & 21
- We are collaborating with the Krakens to promote swim club to students who have attended CAC for lessons
 - Promotional slips will be attached to report cards.

LIFEGUARD CHALLENGE

- We are working hard on building our lifeguards skills and confidence in the water. We have created a lifeguard challenge for the last month not only testing their minimum standards but exceeding beyond them.
- Lifeguards are required to tread with a 20lb brick for 5m. In the challenge they push their skills to do 10m, 15, 20m & 25m.
- Combined some of the skills performing rescues then hopping out of the water to administer 10 rounds of CPR to simulate rescues and challenging their endurance.
- There are 37 items on the skills challenge.
- This is something we will continue to do with the lifeguards to continue building their skills. The importance of not just meeting the minimum standards and growing in our skills has been a priority within the team.

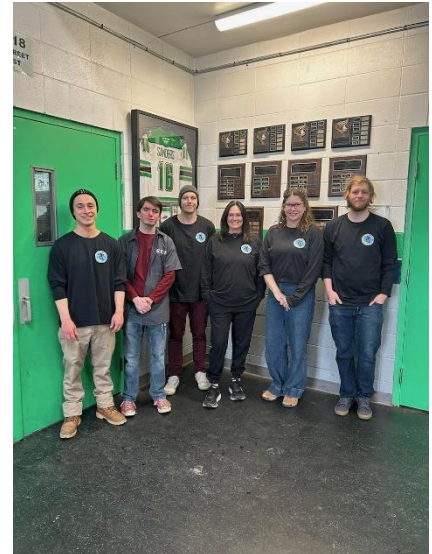
Claresholm Ball Diamonds

- Ball Diamonds Schedule is now available at claresholm.ca under the Arena.
 - The arena calendar has been used for Ball Diamonds since 2024, it's a simple google calendar, embedded into the website
 - Feedback from user groups has been very good.
- User meeting scheduled 6pm April 1, 2025
 - Claresholm Minor Ball Association: 2025 Teams, 2 T-Ball, 2 Coach Pitch, 3 Minors, 2 Majors, 1 Teenage/ Intermediate, U13 Girls Slopitch, & U15 Girls Fastpitch,
 - Teens/ Intermediate/ Chinook: Moffatt Park, West
 - Majors: Tuesdays & Thursdays -Centennial & Millennium SE Times TBD
 - Minors: Monday & Wednesdays – Centennial & Millennium SE Times TBD

 - Little League: T-Ball & Coach Pitch – Centennial small diamonds
 - WCCHS: Girls Highschool Softball team, and 1 Boys baseball team.
 - COED Slo-pitch: Season starts May 28, 2025
 - In 2024 there were 7 teams.
 - Posters have been out in the community since early April.
- Feedback from Minor Ball; Upgrades needed at Centennial park
 - Sponsorships for the ball diamond fence at Centennial would spruce it up
 - Will purchase Chalk/lime for the diamonds, will discuss reimbursement from other groups using the diamonds. ~\$30/bag
- Co-op Community Spaces: results to be released by mid June
- CFEP-Small Funding Opportunities: results should be released by the end of June
- Moffatt Park, the Parks department has added base pins to optimize usage at Moffatt Park. The Girls U13 Slopitch team will be practicing there, and U15 Girls Fastpitch will be playing games there.
 - The decision was made due to the numbers of teams and youth participating, the goal is to ensure there is not a bottleneck at Millennium Diamonds, or the other fields.
- Future Projects include:

- Equipment shed at Millennium Park
- Batters Box-insert for under shale (pricing impacted by the Tarriffs)
- Centennial Dugouts, they are not up to specifications for Minors or Majors ball, legal implications as they do not close

Claresholm Skate Park Association

- Thunders Alumni Tournament, volunteered for alcohol sales Friday, Saturday & Sunday
- The groups Coffee Fundraiser with Barking Cat Coffee, ran from March 15-April 1
 - Sold 64 bags of coffee
- Grand opening of the Skatepark is now rescheduled for fall 2025 to give the grass the opportunity to grow in the dirt areas.



Community Recreation & More

- **Garden Information Series: March 25, 2025**
 - Approximately 50 people attended
 - Oldman Watershed Council, Bronson Enterprises, Chickadee Gardens and a resident passionate about compost all spoke
 - Seeds have been donated by IGA and UFA
 - The Town of Claresholm has an extensive collection of flower and Vegetable seeds
 - The Claresholm Social Centre has been a fantastic collaborator
 - Next date: April 29, 2025 6-8:30pm, With Clay Moss Garden Centre, Oldman Watershed Council, and Chickadee Gardens.
- **Town Planters:**
 - Have been in talks with Hill Top Greenhouse to put aside a selection of Thrillers, Fillers and Spillers for 2025
 - The Town has 16 pots that are set out yearly and planted by Rec and the gardener.
 - Addition of a planter near FCSS doors, Public Works refinished this pot at the request of Recreation
- **Campground Brochure:** The brochure has been updated to reflect 2025-26 pricing, and the updated 50 Amp full- service sites
- **April 9, 2025-** CFEP Grant Webinar
- **April 2, 9, 16th-** Tree Canada Webinar series 10-11am each Wednesday.
 - Was recommended by Tree Canada for those who'd applied for Tree Funding
 - No word yet if we have received funding for the Treemendous Communities Tree Grant
- **Pitch In Canada: May 2 & 3, 2025** Volunteers are needed to do our Annual Community Clean up. Garbage bags and gloves will be available!
- **Soccer:** Nanton and Vulcan require Soccer players, we have gotten those interested in touch with the organizers there.
- **Claresholm Fair Board;** April 30, 2025 is next meeting
 - Look for Bench Show Catalogs popping up around town! The group is reaching out to schools.
- **Community Recreation Guide**
 - Next requests will be placed the beginning of May, so community groups can discuss with their members and have something for the guide.
- **Water Barrel Program 2025-** Program started in 2022, this was the 4th year.

- 33 Barrels were sold, (Up from 26 in 2024) and 8 Water Totes
- One drive made the order and payments for the program easy to manage between front end staff and recreation
- The Barrelman, our supplier, provides barrels from BC to Manitoba. They reuse barrels that would've otherwise been broken down and shipped to China to be made into other items. In 2024, California reached out requesting 30,000 water barrels. They provide Barrels for the City of Calgary, Airdrie, Okotoks, and recently Stavely and Nanton have jumped on board.



- **Welcoming Claresholm:**
 - Working with the group as they navigate the becoming a society process.
 - Held one of our first Sport Evenings for 2025 at the Claresholm Arena
 - 16 attendees came out
- **Spring Prize Draw:** Prizes Family, Adult and Youth pass, 55 gallon rain barrel, 3 piece disc golf set, and Town of Claresholm cooler bag
 - Draw date extended to April 14, all winners have been contacted.
 - Looking to do another draw
- **Radio Engagement:** Representative from The Eagle and Sun Country High River and AM 1140 reached out to assist with our Radio Presence. The first few quotes were out of our budget by a lot. We worked with them in spring/ summer 2024, and Charlie Brown attended the Friday night at the Museum Grounds during Fair Days.
 - In March, they reached out for an Online Auction promotion, where they'd match the dollar value of auction items to provide advertising and promotion for the Town of Claresholm, our events and other community activities.
 - Engagement and Claresholm Recreation provided Gift Certificates in trade for Advertising dollars. The advertising is both online at High River Online, and on the radio.
 - Claresholm Recreation provided \$820.50 worth of passes, Aquafit, and Swim Gear. The Radio Station as part of this promotion matches the amounts we donate.



Bark Park Committee

- Meeting date April 2 was postponed, other dates were rejected. April 28 is the next option.
- Topics would include Gopher control, planting dates for the pollinator gardens with the Oldman Watershed Council and planning of the park, which includes the tire agility course, marking off wild roses and other plantings to ensure they're not mowed over, and anything else that comes up.
- Provided Public Works with a Gopher Clean up poster that can be posted and reused. Scheduling dates can be uncertain due to weather.

CRAZ

- Sat in with the Calgary Regional Airshed Zone representatives over zoom on April 14, 2025

- Request of 3-4 areas where a portable Air Quality truck can be parked for 1 year without being moved
 - Power is required
 - Space away from tall buildings, but central
 - Looking to get a base air quality reading, Claresholm is one of the communities farthest south in the CRAZ
- April 15 again sat in on a zoom meeting: recommended the following areas for Monitoring Station to be situated
 - Town office
 - Claresholm Centennial Campground
 - Claresholm Water plant
- The group will reach out to set up a date to visit Claresholm, and do site tours to determine the viability of the spaces recommended
- Project would commence the beginning of July 2025
 - Education for schools, promotions, and open houses are part of how they roll the project out to communities.

Volunteering Initiative:

- Posters and handouts have been posted throughout town
 - Engagement has been promoting and as well
- Set up on 2 Thursdays at IGA handing out posters and engaging with community members
- Claresholm FCSS is doing a Volunteer Resource Fair September 11, 2025 from 5-8pm in collaboration with the Social Centre and The Alberta Government.
- Volunteer Appreciation Evening: April 22, 2025 had a lot of people in attendance, attendees from last year thought there was a fuller crowd.

- Meeting May 8, 2025
